COURSE OUTLINE Voice and Diction

Course Description

TA 207. Voice and Diction. 3 hours credit. This course will enable the student to develop techniques to expand breath support, vocal range, and dynamics; develop precise articulation and speech practices; discover vocal anatomy; and incorporate the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA). The student will apply vocal dynamics to performance as appropriate for the defined audience. The student will develop a progression of vocal exercises for practical application.
